# Operating Budget including the Florida Medical Practice Plan & DSO Budgets

#### Fund Definitions

 <u>Education and General (E&G)</u> – Appropriated by the State Legislature. Includes General Revenue, Tuition and Fees, and Lottery.

#### Non-E&G

- <u>Designated</u> Collected or set aside for a specific purpose, including funds administered by central offices or administrative departments, along with certain student fees
- <u>Auxiliary</u> Primarily sales to University departments, students, faculty, staff, and others. Also includes some non-F&G student fees
- <u>Restricted</u> Resources whose use is limited by an external agency or donor to a specific manner, purpose, and/or timeframe
- <u>Capital Projects</u> Funds appropriated by the State Legislature for capital projects, along with funds transferred from within the university and from component units for capital projects
- <u>Component Units</u> Includes Direct Support Organization
   (DSO) operations, along with the Florida Medical Practice Plan

#### **Budgeted Assumptions**

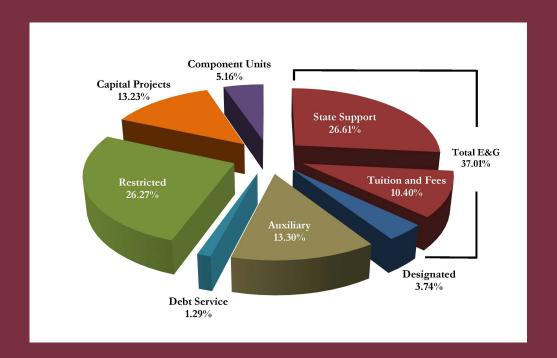
- Full return to campus and pre-pandemic operations for Fall 2021
- No official spending restrictions for FY22
- Hiring freeze is lifting
- No increase to tuition or fees themselves, though enrollment-related increases to associated budgets
- Relatively large "First Time in College" class of ~7,400 (1,000+ larger than target number)
- Minimum wage and other required increases will be implemented in accordance with State law

### Outstanding Budget Issues

- Performance based funding will be non-recurring to the system this year
- House Bill 1261 ("BOGO Bill")
  - Provides a BOGO tuition and fee waiver for upper-level courses in Programs of Strategic Emphasis (PSE) in science, technology, engineering, or math
  - BOG must adopt the eight PSE
  - Based on potential PSE adopted by the BOG, the estimated financial impact to FSU may be:
    - \$1.0M to \$6.2M for tuition
    - \$0.4 to \$2.4M for fees
    - \$1.4M to \$8.6M total
  - \$25M was allocated by the State for the fall and spring semesters only
    - No details regarding how this will be allocated among the SUS institutions
    - It appears any summer semester waivers will need to be covered by institutions
  - PSE enrollment may increase due to the availability of these waivers, increasing the financial impact

### Outstanding Budget Issues

- House Bill 5601 ("Salary Cap Bill")
  - Extends the current \$200k cap on state-funded salaries to include selected faculty
  - BOG is implementing related regulations and guidelines, asking for university feedback
  - Many major issues are under discussion, including whether or not faculty administrators are included in exemptions
  - E&G budget includes the related legislative reduction of \$2.4M
    - Current FSU estimates suggest that the impact may be closer to \$3M
    - Until BOG finalizes specifics, exact E&G impact by College isn't yet known
    - Non-E&G budgets will be impacted as well by amounts that need to be funded outside of E&G

# Finance and Administration Updates

#### F&A Updates

#### Finance and Administration

- FSU School refunded their \$6.9M outstanding 2010 bonds, which provided a gross debt service savings of \$2.2M (\$2.1M net present value)
- New on-campus banking contract with Truist, providing over \$2.5M in value to the University over the next 5 years. Includes free student checking accounts, full service on-campus branch, internships, ATMS across campus, and robust financial literacy program
- Disbursed \$115M of financial aid to 26,000 student, which generated \$38M in student refunds to 15,000 students before Fall semester
- Reopened all student dining venues
- FSU Foundation implemented a new endowment management software system, Fundriver. System will provide a more accurate, efficient, and secure process

#### F&A Updates

#### Finance and Administration

- New policy on Essential Personnel Designation & Compensation
- Launched Alternate Work Location Pilot Program
- Reached agreement with UFF, AFSCME, FNA, and PBA on 2021-2022
   Supplemental Agreement
- Earned INSIGHT Into Diversity's "Higher Education Excellence in Diversity" (HEED) Award for the 8<sup>th</sup> consecutive year
- Implemented a COVID Leave Pool for employees required to quarantine but have no leave
- Established a streamlined carryforward spending plan reconciliation process
- Selected new budget and planning solution vendor, and launched software implementation project

### Bargaining Updates

#### UFF 2021-2022 Reopener Negotiations

- Tentative agreement ratified on October 15<sup>th</sup>
- Article 23, Salaries:
  - 12% and 15% Promotional Increases
  - 3% Sustained Performance Increases for top ranked faculty with seven (7) years continuous service
- Bonus amount equal to 3% of base salary with a \$3,000 minimum, prorated by FTE to be reflected in November 19<sup>th</sup> paycheck
- Article 8, Appointments; Article 17, Leaves; Article 19, Conflict of Interest; Article 24, Benefits: Status Quo

### Bargaining Updates

#### **GAU Bargaining**

- 2021-2024 Successor Negotiations
  - Currently negotiating a new three-year bargaining agreement (full book) with all articles opened
  - Held 14 sessions with the next session scheduled for October 19<sup>th</sup>
- GAU Impact Bargaining
  - Agreement reached on MOU, pending ratification

### Bargaining Updates

#### Staff Collective Bargaining

- AFSCME 2021-2022 Supplemental Agreement
  - Reached agreement on a one-time, non-recurring bonus of 3% of an employee's base salary, with a minimum bonus amount of \$2,000.00
- Reached agreement with all staff unions on a Memorandum of Agreement for Thanksgiving Fall Holiday and Winter Break Leave 2021

#### F&A Updates

#### Finance and Administration

- Developed Sustainability & Green Office workshops
- Included a Sustainability module within the HR New Employee Orientation
- Planted herb gardens across campus
- First university in the state of Florida to become Green Seal Certified
- Distributed more than 4 semi-truckloads of HEPA air filters
- Working with the Seminole Legacy Golf Club Advisory Board, the University recently executed a new 2-Year Golf Club Management Agreement with Troon, the world's largest golf management company, beginning Oct 26, 2021.
